HIGHLIGHTS:

The museum will be open Monday evening June 4th from 5 pm until 9 pm for ROCIC Conference attendees. The Conference is being held at the Lexington Center. Anyone else who wishes to visit us at the museum is welcome.

We also opened for a few hours on Thursday evening May 24th for the old Lexington Car exhibit displayed in Cheapside Park. The Fire Dept. brought their 1928 Ahrens Fox Fire Truck. We had several visitors for the evening open house.

SPECIAL NOTES:

The restored 1910-1911 photo of the Fire Department has been completed and is hanging in the museum. Other projects in the works are a composite of all members of the Lexington Police Department in 1960 and a 49 photo collage taken on the last day of the Fayette County Police Department's existence on December 31st 1972.

Another old Lexington star badge is on loan to the museum and is displayed showing a photo of the officer wearing it in 1911. Badge #29 was loaned to the museum by Jane Ellen Myers and John C. Bricken who are the great-grandchildren of Officer Michael Crawley.

The open house and tour on May 1st at 6:30pm for the Citizen Fire Academy Alumni was very successful. We had nine people signed in for the tour and sold \$70 worth of merchandise.

The 1920's riot at the old courthouse exhibit is complete and is attached to the new display wall that Max Hellmueller built. This wall gives us enough space for three exhibits to be displayed simultaneously. On one end, we have photos and the jail bars from the old workhouse that was built in the 1830's. We hope to have a fire exhibit on the other side and are working with John Malick to assist us with that project.

OTHER NOTES:

Check out www.policejewelrypins.com for solid gold or sterling silver Lexington badge pendants, charms, rings, etc. Retired St. Louis Police Officer Don Pipes makes them and they are of very high quality. They are struck from brass dies instead of rubber moldings. Gold from a refinery is used to make the jewelry, not scrap gold. You can scroll down the page to Lexington Kentucky and order online.



Two cameras have been installed in two of our rooms and the volunteer can now view the monitor from the volunteer booth. Paul Mitchell also installed a buzzer system so the volunteer will know when someone enters the rooms down the hallway.

MERCHANDISE:

Personalized Coffee Mug/Glass Stein orders for the Police Department were in high demand for the Christmas season. We now have the ability to make personalized coffee mugs/steins for the Fire Department, Community Corrections and E.R.U. The cost is \$15 for the coffee mugs and \$18 for the steins and the turnaround time is usually less than 10 days. Feel free to email me with your order. The mugs come in Blue or Black with a gold or silver badge. Name, rank and badge number can be placed on the mugs/steins. Mugs with colors such as red, green, yellow, maroon, pink, and others are also available.

Our most recent badge pin was for Community Corrections. There are now seven badge pins that have been created. They are Fayette County Police circa 1960's, Fayette County Police circa 1950's, Lexington City Police circa 1973, current Lexington-Fayette Urban County Police, current Lexington Fire Department and the current University of KY Police badge pin. The UK pin is about sold out. The badge pins are \$5 each.

We are taking orders on crystal blocks with the badge image in 3D. These blocks can be personalized with your name and badge number. Cost is \$20 for the crystal block and for an additional \$10; you can order a lighted base in all white or multi-colored lights. We also have crystal blocks with the 3D image of the police cruiser in it. We have these in stock and they are also \$20 each.

The Diecast Gearbox 2003 Police cruisers are sold out. We still have plenty of the 1997 Road Champs at \$12 each.

We have another very limited supply of the 1/25 scale custom built Lexington Police cruisers in a clear plastic display case. The cost is \$30 and you can only buy them at the museum. The brand is Welly and Keith Stevens of the Sheriff's Dept made them.

A Lexington Police pewter badge money clip is also in the design stage and we hope to be selling them for \$10 each. We are also looking at funding a generic Lexington Police challenge coin made by Symbol Arts, who made the other special unit challenge coins. We will be forwarding these proposals to the Chief's office for approval soon. Pike Spraggins is assisting us in the design of the challenge coin.



ABOUT US:

The Lexington Public Safety Museum is located in the Lexington History Center on the first floor. The Lexington History Center is also known as the old courthouse. The KY Renaissance Pharmacy Museum is also on the first floor. The Lexington History Museum occupies the second and third floor. The Public Safety Museum is open on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The hours are 12 noon until 4 pm. There is no charge for admission. We are closed Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, but will open by appointment or during special events by request.

At this time, the museum is divided into five rooms. They are based on a timeline. The first room exhibits items/photos from the 1800's to the 1930's. It adjoins the "Fallen Heroes" room, which honors all Public Safety Officers who have died in the line of duty. Down the hallway are three more rooms. The first and second room exhibits items from the 1940's-1950's and the third room is from the 1960's-1970's. Our first exhibit has been on Public Safety Buildings past and present. We have tried to put an emphasis on the different buildings that Public Safety has occupied over the years. This includes showing photos of old Police Departments, Jails and Fire Stations. We are also increasing our photo collection to include vehicles and people. In addition, the museum has other items of interest such as old badges, patches, uniforms, jail keys, photos, fire and police equipment and other memorabilia.

The museum has gift shop type items for sale as part of the fundraising efforts. These items include die cast police cars, badge pins, coffee mugs, drinking glasses, throws or blankets and other items of interest. Polo type shirts are on sale at the museum. Merchandising has accounted for more than half of our revenue. The other half of the revenue has come from donations and memberships.

We have several types of memberships depending on the amount of money donated. The types of memberships are student, individual, family, silver shield and gold shield. Forty-four members have dues paid up until the end of 2007 and Silver Shield member James Laughlin has renewed through 2008. Our members' names are always on display at the entrance to the museum.
