



Bi-Monthly Report **DISPATCHES** December 1st, 2008

HIGHLIGHTS:

The museum had 175 visitors in October and 70 visitors in November. We were closed 3 days in October and 5 days in November due to Thanksgiving, cancellations or no volunteers. We had over 100 visitors the evening of the Fire Prevention Parade on October 6th. The Fire Dept. served hotdogs in Cheapside Park and we served cookies and Apple Cider in the museum. We also had 21 Fire Dept. Recruits on October 13th.

ROLL CALL:

The next meeting for board members and interested parties will be Tuesday, December 16th at 7:00 pm. The January meeting will be on the 20th at 7:00 pm. We always meet at Columbia's on North Lime at 5:30 for dinner prior to the meeting. The meetings are held on the 3rd Tuesday of each month.

SPECIAL NOTES:

We have a new display with information on the famous female golf pro, Marion Miley, who was brutally murdered in the 1940's. The display features magazine articles, books and a scrapbook compiled by one the Detective's who investigated the case. We have Detective Joe Harrigan's badge displayed. Harrigan also investigated the case. A newspaper photo shows a photo of Joe Harrigan with a Tommy gun prior to picking up one of the suspects in Louisville.

OTHER NOTES:

The museum set up a display on November 19th and 20th at the KY Women's Law Enforcement Conference held at the Holiday Inn North. We featured historical information and photos of women in Lexington's law enforcement history.

The Lexington Police pocket knives sold very well. In fact, so well that we had to cease the fundraiser due to a shortage of knives.

We are still raffling off a complete set of eight Lexington Police challenge coins displayed with a Lexington Police pocket knife in a solid oak display case. The tickets are \$1 each or 6 for \$5. The raffle will be held December 16th at the board meeting or sooner if we sell all 2000 tickets. You can send me money/check through inter-office mail and I will fill out the tickets on your behalf and send you the stubs.

MERCHANDISE:

We have the ability to make personalized coffee mugs/steins for the Urban County Government, Police Department, Fire Department, Community Corrections and E.R.U. The cost is \$15 for the coffee mugs and \$18 for the steins and the turnaround time is usually less than 10 days. Feel free to email me with your order. The mugs come in Blue or Black with a gold or silver badge or city seal. Name, rank and badge number can be placed on the mugs/steins. Mugs with colors such as red, green, yellow, maroon, pink, and others are also available.

Our most recent badge pin was for Community Corrections. There are now seven badge pins that have been created. They are Fayette County Police circa 1960's, Fayette County Police circa 1950's, Lexington City Police circa 1973, current Lexington-Fayette Urban County Police, current Lexington Fire Department and the current University of KY Police badge pin. The UK pin is sold out. The badge pins are \$5 each. We have a Public Safety set for \$15 and it comes in a free display case. It features the current Police, Fire and Corrections badge pins.

We are taking orders on crystal blocks with the badge image in 3D. These blocks can be personalized with your name and badge number. Cost is \$20 for the crystal block and for an additional \$10; you can order a rotating lighted base in all white or multi-colored lights. We also have crystal blocks with the 3D image of the police cruiser in it. We have these in stock and they are \$20 each.

The Diecast Gearbox 2003 Police cruisers are sold out. We still have a few of the 1997 Road Champs at \$12 each.

We ordered 300 more of the Lexington Police challenge coins made by Symbol Arts and they arrived in April. The coin shows the Lexington Badge on one side and a Lexington Police Cruiser with the city skyline on the other. They are selling for \$8.00 each. This will be our last order of these coins so get them while you can.



ABOUT US:

The Lexington Public Safety Museum is located in the Lexington History Center on the first floor. The Lexington History Center is also known as the old courthouse. The KY Renaissance Pharmacy Museum and the Isaac Hathaway African American Museum are also on the first floor. The Lexington History Museum occupies the second and third floor. The Public Safety Museum is open on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The hours are 12 noon until 4 pm. There is no charge for admission. We are closed Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, but will open by appointment or during special events by request.

At this time, the museum is divided into five rooms. They are based on a timeline. The first room exhibits items/photos from the 1800's to the 1930's. It adjoins the "Fallen Heroes" room, which honors all Public Safety Officers who have died in the line of duty. Down the hallway are three more rooms. The first and second room exhibits items from the 1940's-1950's and the third room is from the 1960's-1970's. Our first exhibit has been on Public Safety Buildings past and present. We have tried to put an emphasis on the different buildings that Public Safety has occupied over the years. This includes showing photos of old Police Departments, Jails and Fire Stations. We are also increasing our photo collection to include vehicles and people. In addition, the museum has other items of interest such as old badges, patches, uniforms, jail keys, photos, fire and police equipment and other memorabilia.

The museum has gift shop type items for sale as part of the fundraising efforts. These items include die cast police cars, badge pins, coffee mugs, drinking glasses, books, throws or blankets and other items of interest. Polo type shirts are on sale at the museum. Merchandising has accounted for more than half of our revenue. The other half of the revenue has come from donations and memberships.

We have several types of memberships depending on the amount of money donated. The types of memberships are student, individual, family, silver shield and gold shield. Fifty-five members have dues paid up through 2008 and 2009. Our members' names are always on display at the entrance to the museum. We have sent out renewal notices to members for 2009.
